
Message from District Governor Frank Hewitt

GOODSTART program



Bath & District Lions have created their GoodStart program. This service augments the nutrition program at Bath Public School. The club provides food supplies up to \$500.00 month, with Lions Joanne and Rod Irwin do the shopping. Every Monday and Friday starting at 7:30, Lions Joanne and Andy Vandesande & other Lions who can drop in, prepare 90 egg McMuffins, wrapping them in foil. When children arrive at school they can pickup one giving them a good start to the day. There is no means test, any child can have one. Down the road is a plan to alternate and do pancakes once a month with Lions Joanne and Rod having already acquired 90 sets of bowl, plate, knife and fork. The other

weekdays parent volunteers fill in.

The funds for this comes from our participation in staffing a Bingo Hall overseen by the Ontario Lottery & Gaming Corp. Lions 4 weeks/month, assist the hall staff in operating the bingo with the club receiving money in recognition.

"Along with a donation of \$6000 back in April, these two donations will support a year of fresh, healthy food being provided to Centreville and Newburgh Public Schools," says Andy Mills, Executive Director of The Food Sharing Project. Mills was joined by Lions Club members, staff and students at Centreville Public School on September 20 to receive the donation.

The Food Sharing Project is the charity which provides nutritious food to the schools for in-school meals and snacks. Each week, over \$20,000 of food is delivered to the doors of 88 schools across Kingston, Frontenac, and Lennox & Addington, at no charge to the schools.

"Young people are our future, and it is important that we give them all the tools they need to succeed," says Newburgh-Camden Lions Club Past-President Vic Smith, "and healthy food is the most basic thing they need to get through the day, and do well at school, and beyond." The Newburgh-Camden Lions Club is a small rural chapter of the international organization and runs activities and raises funds to improve well-being and strengthen communities. The money raised was earmarked for the food programs at Newburgh and Centreville Public Schools, which operate within the chapter's jurisdiction.

Peter Mouncey, Principal at Centreville and Newburgh Public Schools, applauds this three-way partnership between his schools, the Food Sharing Project and the Newburgh-Camden chapter of the Lions Club. "Having their daily nutritional needs met means that students have healthy bodies and active minds," says Mouncey.



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REINDEER TRIVIA

Santa's reindeer first appeared in 1821 in a children's poem, 'Old Santeclaus with Much Delight', published in New York. And the names of Santa's reindeer were introduced in a 1823 poem, entitled 'A Visit from St. Nicholas' by Clement Clark Moore and later became even more popular by classic holiday specials on TV.



However, Rudolph was first mentioned 100 years after the other reindeer! May and has since found a place in people's hearts worldwide each festive season!
